Peach Cobbler

Ingredients

½ cup of unsalted butter

1 cup of all-purpose flour

- 2 cups sugar; divided
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- A pinch of salt
- 1 cup of milk
- 4 cups of fresh peach slices
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice

Ground cinnamon or nutmeg (recommended)

1/2 cup of brown sugar



Melt butter into a 13 x 9-inch baking dish

Combine flour, 1 cup of sugar, baking powder, and salt; add milk stirring just until dry ingredients are moistened; pour batter over butter and don't stir as you pour the mixture in the pan.

Bring remaining cup of sugar, peach slices, and lemon juice to a boil, stirring constantly; pour over batter and don't stir.

Sprinkle with cinnamon or nutmeg when you remove it from the oven,
