

Living History Mural

Create a mural that illustrates key moments in Black History in education, such as the Little Rock Nine, the Civil Rights Movement, and contemporary efforts to close the achievement gap.

Black History Scavenger Hunt

Create a scavenger hunt that guides students through the school and community to learn about the history of Black History in education, and the actions being taken today to support Black students





Book Club

Organize a book club for elementary students to read and discuss literature on Black History in education, such as "The Freedom Writers" or "March: Book One."

Wall of Quotes

Create a wall of inspirational quotes from Black historical figures. Students may choose to create visuals to accompany the quotes and then display them to families.

Living the Legacy

Have students research and create a presentation on a member of the MSCS Alumni Hall of Fame to help students learn not only *Black* History, but Black Memphis History. View the HOF here.

Equity in Action

Create a social action project where students come up with ways they can support Black student equity (and equality) in their school and community.



Poetry of Black History

Encourage students to write poems or songs about Black historical figures, landmarks, and/or events and share them at a school event.



Have students **create art pieces** that reflect our mission to Honor the Past & See the Future. You can display them in a school-wide exhibition!





Letter Writing Campaign

Encourage students to write letters to their elected officials, advocating for more resources and support for Black students and education equality.



Middle School Teacher Resources



FROM AVA DUVERNAY DIRECTOR OF SELMA

- Create a timeline of important events and figures in Black History in innovation.
- Read and discuss books by Black authors that explore themes including the push for equality, such as *The Watsons Go to Birmingham* by Christopher Paul Curtis or *The Hate U Give* by Angie Thomas.
- Watch and discuss documentary films such as "13th" or "I Am Not Your Negro," which explore the intersection of race and its impact on current social structures.
- Organize a field trip to a historic site related to Black History in education, such as the Little Rock Central High School National Historic Site.
- Invite a guest speaker from a Black student organization or a local Black-led organization to speak about their work in promoting educational equity.
- Create a visual art project that reflects on the theme.
- Research and present on the current state of educational opportunities for Black students.



High School Tencher Resources

- Create a podcast or radio show that explores Black History in education and interviews current historians and activists about their experiences and perspectives.
- Create a virtual reality experience that allows users to explore historical sites and learn about the Civil Rights Movement and desegregation.
- Write a play or musical that tells the story of Black history in education and the fight for desegregation.
- Create a quilt or mural that showcases the contributions of Black educators and activists in the fight for equality.
- Organize a photo exhibit that highlights the experiences of Black Memphians in the struggle for desegregation.
- Host a poetry slam or spoken word event that encourages students to express their thoughts and feelings about the theme.
- Develop a social media campaign that raises awareness about the ongoing impact of Black history in innovation.
