

Objectives

- To increase student access to academically rigorous courses
- To increase access to post-secondary opportunities
- To accelerate learning and ease the transition to college
- To begin working toward a college degree while still pursuing a high school diploma

SCS DISTRICT-WIDE DUAL ENROLLMENT EARLY COLLEGE ACCESS

- Shelby County Schools' Dual Enrollment Program provides qualified high school students the opportunity to enroll in college courses earning both college and high school credits while in high school.
- College courses offered through the dual enrollment program are taught either at the postsecondary institution or at the high school, by the postsecondary faculty or a secondary teacher who is a credentialed adjunct faculty.
- Participating students must meet the college's admissions requirements for general education, articulation and early admissions' programs.

TENNESSEE DUAL ENROLLMENT GRANT

The Dual Enrollment Grant program is defined as a grant for study at an eligible postsecondary institution that is funded from net proceeds of the state lottery and awarded to students who are attending an eligible high school and who are also enrolled in college courses at eligible postsecondary institutions for which they will receive college credit.

The Dual Enrollment Grant program is funded by the Tennessee Lottery and administered by the Tennessee Student Assistance Corporation. This program provides opportunities for students to begin working toward a college degree, while still pursuing a high school diploma.

Students in dual enrollment courses may receive the following:

- Up to \$500 for course 1
- Up to \$500 for course 2
- Up to \$200 for course 3
- No Award for course 4
- Up to \$100 per credit hour for courses 5 10

Let's Get Your Students Enrolled

Requirements

- Freshman, sophomore, junior or senior students
- Dual enrollment students may take any class as long as they meet the prerequisites and/or eligibility requirements.
 - College level courses have an ACT (18 for Math and 19 for English) and high school Grade Point Average (GPA) requirement.
- The dual enrollment grant is funded through the state lottery and is available to apply toward the cost of courses at the selected college.
 - Funds 2 courses
 - Students must complete the TSAC grant application
- Meet the approval of your guidance counselor and/or principal.
- Complete the required documents for entrance into the program.

Process

- Complete the Southwest "online application" www.southwest.tn.edu/ApplyOnline.htm
- Complete and submit the Dual Enrollment Program Participation Agreement.
- Complete and Submit the Dual Enrollment Student Data Form.
- Complete and submit the Immunization Health Form.

Dual Enrollment Admission

For the Fall 2020 academic year, dual enrollment students who do not have an ACT/SAT test score can use a GPA of 3.0 or higher to be admissible to the program. We will continue to accept the Pre-ACT and PSAT test scores if available. Please note that prior high school math/English grades may be evaluated for students wanting to take a math or English course.

Admission requirements for the high school based program are as follows:

19 composite score on the ACT

18 English sub-score for students taking English Composition

19 math sub-score for students taking College Algebra (MATH 1710); 15 sub-score for students taking MATH 1539 (Prob. Stats)

100 admissions index score: 30 times the high school GPA (based on a 4.0 scale) plus the composite ACT score

Example: High School GPA of a $2.85 \times 30 = 85.5 + 19 = 104.5$

UofM Dual Enrollment Fees and Grants New! The maximum number of courses has increased from 8 to 10; HOPE eligible students can use up to 3 grants per term beginning Fall 2020

A. *Institutional grants are available on the third and fourth courses if students have directed their first three TSAC Lottery Dual Enrollment grants to the UofM (students must be in their junior or senior year of high school for the TN lottery grant and the institutional grant). The institutional grant applies to the high school based dual enrollment program only.

B. If students are eligible for the HOPE scholarship, they can obtain up to \$300 per course for courses 5 through 8 (deducted from their future college HOPE award).

C. All state financial aid will be applied to the course cost before institutional grant funds are applied.

D. The amount of the institutional grant listed above is a maximum amount after TSAC funds are applied.

E. Other discounts do not apply to the high school based program as per our memorandum of understanding with each school/school system.

F. To receive funding for more than one course in the same semester, a student must also meet the HOPE Scholarship requirements (3.0 cumulative high school GPA or a 21 composite score on the ACT).

G. The above fees are based on the student receiving the lottery grant and directing the grant to the UofM.

Frequently Asked Questions


- Do you have to pass an exam to be awarded credit?
 - No, students receive a letter grade as outlined in the course syllabus.
- Will Dual Enrollment Credit transfer to other colleges and universities?
 - In most cases the courses transfer without a problem. Contact school(s) you are planning to attend after high school to be sure.
- What if I have not taken the ACT yet?
 - If no ACT or SAT exists, we can use scores from PSAT, PLAN, ASPIRE, PreACT
- Can students take courses from more than one college or institution?
 - Yes, but keep in mind that the institutional funds are available to students taking courses 1-4 with UofM.


Important to Know

- Institutional grants for students who take courses 1-4 with UofM
- 2.75 <u>College</u> GPA to keep TSAC funding
- HOPE Scholarship requirements (3.0 GPA OR ACT of 21 or higher) apply when taking 2-3 courses during the <u>same</u> term.
- Students should pay any balances to their high school. The UofM will invoice the high school directly.



SIGNING UP FOR DUAL ENROLLMENT

- Notify your counselor and complete the appropriate application packet available on the Central website.
- Confirm that you have completed the correct TSAC Dual Enrollment Grant and selected the correct school
- Notify Mr. Allred to ensure you are on the roster.
- Look for an acceptance email with instructions for creating your college student account.
- Look at the college calendar which will be different than SCS.
- Once the class has uploaded, pay attention to the syllabus, including required books, etc.

DUAL ENROLLMENT GRADING

- DE class grades are only reported at the end of the semester. There will be no report cards or progress reports.
- Communication is extremely important and most instructors will give us notice when students are falling behind, but will not give us specific grades.
- As far as this class is concerned, the DE student is expected to keep up and ask for assistance when needed.
- Once final grades are reported, they will be added to PowerSchool manually.



COSTS

- As stated before, grade 11 and 12 students in Tennessee are eligible for a dual enrollment grant covering the tuition for the first two courses and \$200 for the third as long as they maintain a 2.75 COLLEGE GPA.
- Taking advantage of this grant for three classes (or 9 hours) will result in a cost of \$300. Taking 9 hours as a college freshmen in a public university can cost close to \$4000 or more.

TENNESSEE STATEWIDE DUAL CREDIT



TENNESSEE STATEWIDE DUAL CREDIT

- Statewide dual credit classes are college-level courses taught at the high-school level by trained high-school teachers. Course learning objectives are developed by Tennessee high school and college faculty in order to ensure alignment with post-secondary standards.
- All students enrolled in a statewide dual credit
 course take the online challenge exam, which is
 used to assess mastery of the postsecondary-level
 learning objectives. Students which meet or exceed
 the exam 'cut score' receive college credit that can
 be applied to any Tennessee public postsecondary
 institution. Exam scores are reported on the high
 school transcript to ensure postsecondary credit is
 accurately awarded but are not used in any state
 accountability measures.

Dual Enrollment VS SW Dual Credit

Dual Enrollment

- •Student is enrolled in both Central and at the college
- Course is taught by a college instructor
- Course is one semester
- •No report cards or progress reports until the end of the semester
- College professors cannot discuss grades with parents regardless of student age
- Student will have a college transcript
- May be costs depending on the number of courses taken.
- Must maintain a 2.75 college GPA to remin eligible for state and local funding

Dual Credit

- Student is only enrolled at Central
- Course is taught by a trained high school teacher
- Course is a full year
- Grades reported for each report card and progress report
- Parents can meet with teachers as usual
- Credit is reported on the high school transcript
- Course is completely free
