





What is the Academic Scorecard?


The Academic Scorecard is a report available in PowerSchool that allows parents and guardians the ability to view their child's academic, attendance, and behavior data in one centralized location.

Behavior

Student behavior prevention and intervention strategies as defined in the State RTI2-Behavior framework involving all staff are key positive culture building activities. Student discipline actions are tracked in five categories:

Progressive Discipline Events: 0

Response to Instruction & Intervention (RTI2) indicates any formal academic intervention a student is receiving in English Language Arts or math. Intervention intensity and frequency increases across Tier 2 and 3.

Students in Tier 1 engage in grade level content during Core instruction. K-2 students performing below grade level in reading receive additional support through the Third Grade Commitment (3GC).

Students in Tier 2 receive additional small group and online intervention. Progress is monitored bi-weekly.

Students in Tier 3 receive more frequent and intense small group and online intervention, compared to Tier 2. Progress is monitored weekly.

FastBridge Universal Screener measures students' overall reading and math achievement levels three times per year compared to other students in the same grade level. The results are used to identify students who may undergo further assessment for interventions as well as eligibility for enrichment and advanced academic programs, such as CLUE.



The results show both the student's **Scaled Score** and the students achievement **Percentile** compared to the national average. Students above the 50th percentile have higher achievement than half of all students tested nationally.

The **IReady Diagnostic** is a computer adaptive assessment intended to measure student academic performance and growth. Teachers are able to track student performance aligned with grade level Reading and Math expectations.

The assessment measures students' overall reading and math achievement levels three times per year compared to grade-level expectations. Students can perform On or Above Grade Level, One Grade Level Below, or Two or More Grade Levels Below.

Third Grade Commitment

The Third Grade Commitment (3GC) policy is a collaborative effort between schools, parents, and communities to ensure all students have the foundational literacy skills they need to be successful for life.

Third Grade has been identified as the year students are no longer "learning to read" but are "reading to learn". Reading on grade-level by third grade ensures students have the tools they need to access curriculum in grades 3-12 and beyond. SCS is committed to partnering with families to help students reach reading-readiness before third grade.

Certain benchmarks have been set for student's to demonstrate their grade-level readiness for reading. Each metric is presented below with your student's performance on that metric. These benchmarks allow educators to identify students in need of additional literacy intervention and which skills require additional development.




- The TCAP Family Portal is provided by the Tennessee Department of Education.

- One barrier to parents using the TCAP Family Portal is that it requires them
 to know their child's TN student ID. This TN Student ID is different than the
 student's PowerSchool ID. It is also important to put two zeros in front of
 the student's 7-digit ID.



STEPS TO ACCESS THE TCAP FAMILY PORTAL



Locate your child's Tennessee State Student ID number. This number is NOT the same as the PowerSchool Student ID but can be found using the PowerSchool parent portal. The ID number will start with two zeros and be displayed in green.






Once you have the Tennessee State Student ID number, go online to the TCAP Family Portal at familyreport.tnedu.gov. Enter the ID in the area labeled "Student ID (USID)" and use the drop-down tabs to enter your child's birth date. Then, click "Go." The system will pull up your child's results for review.


If you are a new user you will be prompted to create a password for your account. Once your password has been established, it will allow you to pull up your child's results.









- Mastery Connect is an assessment platform that allows teachers to assess student mastery of specific standards.
- Students can receive results instantly.
- The results are displayed by standard, so although students will still get an overall percentage on any assessment taken, the focus is on the mastery of the specific standards.

- The test will be housed in Mastery Connect.



- Naviance connects the dots between student interests and college and career choices and stay motivated to choose the choose their best-fit postsecondary path.



Our 8-12th grade students utilize Naviance to develop a 4-Year Focused Plan of Study

Purpose



Participating in the 4-Year Focused Plan of Study activity provides an opportunity for Students and Parents/Guardians to:

- Learn about graduation requirements, early post-secondary opportunities (EPSOs), and elective focuses available to students. Ready Graduate Video
- Explore course options for grades nine through twelve (9-12) based on their skills, interests, goals, and postsecondary aspirations.
- Develop an initial plan of study that will help support transition to high school and preparation for postsecondary options and success.

High School Student Expectations



- Complete pre-work activities to help prepare for process.
- Create or update 4-Year Course Plan in Naviance during March 7th April 1st.
- Share plan with parents/guardians in Naviance (students log in and parents view student's Course Plan) and determine if edits are needed.
- Check plan to ensure it meets requirements and is approved by School Counselor no later than April 8th.

Parent Expectations



- Check for school notifications regarding the 4-Year Course Plan and next steps during March April 8th.
- Review plan in Naviance (students log in and parents view student's Course Plan) with student to ensure it meets requirements.
- Contact the School Counselor for questions or to request for edits.
- Parent Approval: Indicate agreement with plan during time-frame shared by school (i.e., signature, form, e-mail, etc.).
- If parent does not respond, the plan will be approved in Naviance.

4-Year Course Plan Approval Process



Steps 1-2

- Student creates a 4-Year Course Plan and submit for approval in Naviance.
- School Counselor will review plan to ensure it meets requirments.

Steps 3-4

- Student/Parentguardian will review plan in Naviance.
- Parent-guardian will indicate agreemment via school method.



- School Counselor will adderess any request for edits and confirm parent agreement.
- The plan will be approved in Naviance if it meets regiuriments.

What is the SEM Advancement Act?



The SEM Advancement Act is a new state law that expands students' access to advanced courses.

- All 7-12 grade students who meet the criteria for advanced courses in ELA, mathematics, and/or science will be <u>identified</u> and <u>notified</u> in writing.
- These courses include, but are not limited to:
 - Honors
 - Advanced Placement (AP)
 - Cambridge International
 - Capstone Industry Certification-Aligned

- College Level Exam Program (CLEP)
- Dual Enrollment (DE)
- International Baccalaureate (IB)
- Local and Statewide Dual Credit
- Families who do not wish to take advantage of advanced courses may **opt out** of this opportunity in the PowerSchool parent portal.

How can my child participate in advanced courses?



- Students with a B or higher AND a score of On Track/Mastery on the TCAP Achievement/EOC in their
 previous ELA, mathematics, and/or science course will be <u>automatically enrolled into the next</u>
 <u>respective Honors course(s)</u> based on class availability.
- Students who do not meet these criteria may still be considered for Honors courses.
- Students may also be eligible for advanced courses such as Advanced Placement (AP), Dual Enrollment (DE), International Baccalaureate (IB), Local and/or Statewide Dual Credit (LDC/SDC), or Industry Certification (IC).
 - These courses are Early Postsecondary Opportunities (EPSOs) that enable students to potentially earn <u>college credit</u> while in high school.
 - All students who meet the eligibility criteria will be notified in writing.


About the Tutoring Program

Structured tutoring programs have been proven to significantly increase student achievement when implemented in a clearly defined program that encompasses consistency, quality materials, and well-trained tutors.

Our before/after school tutoring program is aligned as follows:

- Dates: September 5, 2023-April 12, 2024
- Students Impacted: 11,000
- 1:8 ratio maximum: 1:5 ratio minimum
- Schools can choose either: A) 3 days per week for 1 hour per day or B) 2 days per week for 1.5 hours per day & C) up to 2
 Saturdays per month (Saturday tutoring is optional based on available staff for program but strongly encouraged for all
 sites)
- Schools should prioritize available spaces for, previously retained, overage for grade and Below and Approaching students.
 Please begin identifying students based on your 22-23 data for your tutoring program to contact parents.
- Elementary students will receive additional instruction in ELA and/or Math
- High school students will receive additional instruction in EOC content (9-10) and ACT prep (11-12)
- Schools can decide whether a student participates in ELA or Math based on the student data
- Students will not participate in both ELA/Math within the same semester
- Students can potentially receive tutoring in one subject the first semester and a different subject the second semester






