


### **WE NEED YOU HERE!!!**

Each year the Tennessee State Department of Education categorizes schools based on performance. One of the criteria that determines a school's classification is attendance. In order to make AYP, a school must have an average daily attendance rate of 93 %. Therefore, it is critical that all students come to school each and every day. ### **Cooking and Learning for the Holidays**

December is a time for baking and sharing. Have fun this holiday season and have children help measure and count baking ingredients. For example, "We need two eggs. Let's count them." Talk to them about the measurement tools: "We need 2 and 1/4 cups of flour: one cup, two cups, and this 1/4 cup is smaller...it takes four of these to equal the

big cup." Explain what each ingredient is and where it comes from: flour comes from wheat, eggs come from chickens, butter comes from the milk that we get from cows, nuts grow on trees, etc. Use food colors to make red or green cookies or

breads. Discuss the three primary colors (red, yellow, and blue) and let the children mix the colors together to create new ones. If you really

want to have some fun, use ABC cookie cutters and have young children make cookies to spell their friends' names. Decorate in your usual holiday fashion. - Enforce a rule that your child spends no more than two hours a day watching TV, playing video and computer games, and surfing the Web.
- 2. Encourage your child to read at least 15 minutes a day. Reading boost concentration, vocabulary, and academic success.
- 3. Have a variety of reading materials handy. Visit the library often and help your children choose materials they will enjoy.
- 4. Make reading time special. Arrange a comfortable spot and a set time to read as a family, whether you read the same book together or separate books individually.
- 5. Even older children enjoy hearing books read to them, so act stories as you read aloud.
- Take turns reading to each other. Be patient with beginning readers. Offer help only if they are struggling.
- 7. Follow up on what you have read. Talk about books at dinner or at regular "family book club" discussions.
- 8. If you read the same book together, ask questions as you go along. Help kids learn to analyze a story's plot, theme, and characters.
- 9. If your kids want to see a movie that is based on a book, have them read the book first. They will learn there is more in books than can be shown on a screen!
- 10. Set a good example by reading daily and limiting your own TV-viewing to less than
