Students will talk about and ask questions about their thoughts in order to clarify and improve their own mathematical understanding. Teachers will use various strategies to help students master the skill. For example, teachers will use math games to check for students understanding. Equity sticks can be used to assure that all students are learning. Technology, textbooks, small group instruction, etc. can also be used.
