Why are we here?

CRAIGMONT HIGH SCHOOL is a federally funded school-wide Title I school. The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) requires that each Title I school hold an annual meeting of Title I families in order to:

- •inform you of your school's participation in Title I,
- •explain the requirements of Title I, and
- •explain your rights as parents and family members to be involved.



What is a Title I School?

- O Title I was passed in 1965 under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). It is the largest federal assistance program for our nation's schools.
- O Title I schools receive extra funding (Title I dollars) from the federal government. These dollars are used to:
 - ✓ identify students experiencing academic difficulties and provide assistance to help these students;
 - ✓ purchase additional staff, programs, materials, and/or supplies; and
 - ✓ conduct parent and family engagement meetings, trainings, events, and/or activities.



Parents Right to Know

All parents have the right to request the following:

- A teacher's professional qualifications which includes: state qualifications, licensure, grade certification, waivers.
- A teacher's baccalaureate and/or graduate degree, fields of endorsement, previous teaching experience
- An assurance that their child's name, address, and telephone listing not be released to military recruiters.

District revised Policy 5005 – If a student does not complete the AP, IB, or SDC exam on the required dates of testing, the additional quality points allocated will be removed from the student's grades earned **throughout the year.**



Parents Right to Know

All parents will receive information on the following:

- Their child's level of achievement in each of the state academic assessments
- O Their option to request a transfer to another school within the district if their child is the victim of violent crime at school
- Their right to timely notification that their child has been assigned or has been taught for four or more consecutive weeks by a teacher who is not highly qualified

Title I Funds

In general, Title I funds may be used for:

- ✓ smaller class sizes,
- ✓ additional teachers and paraprofessionals,
- ✓ additional training for school staff,
- ✓ extra time for instruction (before and/or after school programs),
- ✓ parent and family engagement activities, and/or
- ✓ a variety of supplemental teaching materials, equipment, and technology.



What is the SIP/CIP?

The SIP/CIP is the School or Continuous Improvement Plan. It includes: the identification of the school planning team and how they will be engaged in the planning process;

- a needs assessment and summary of academic and non-academic data;
- prioritized goals, strategies, and action steps to help address the academic and nonacademic needs of students;
- o teacher and staff professional development needs; and
- o budgets and the coordination of resources.

The school must include family representatives on our school planning team, and we need you!!

- ✓ provide parents opportunities to volunteer; and
- ✓ ensure regular two-way meaningful communication between family members and staff, to the extent practicable, in a language family members can understand.
